For decades, CAIR has worked to defend the rights of Muslim students, protect religious freedom, and ensure that schools are welcoming and inclusive spaces for all children. In 2024, CAIR launched its Unhostile Campus Campaign aimed at fostering college and university campus environments where students, faculty, and staff enjoy free speech and academic freedom. This resource guide is an expansion of the Unhostile Campus Campaign to K-12 schools.

Every new school year brings opportunities for growth and learning, but it can also bring challenges. Muslim students often face bullying, bias, Islamophobia, and unequal access to accommodations for their faith-based needs. Your rights. Your voice. Your faith.

Muslim students may be challenged with...

- ▶ Limited or denied accommodations for prayer, holidays, or dietary needs
- ▶ Bullying, harassment, or targeting based on religious or cultural identity
- ► Administrators, faculty, or staff displaying cultural insensitivity
- Biased or inaccurate curriculum content, assignments, or classroom discussions
- ▶ Learning environments that exclude or marginalize Muslim students
- Social isolation or lack of belonging in school settings

As a student, you have the right to...

- Wear religious clothing or clothing with a religious message in the same manner as other similar messages are allowed
- ► Share information about your faith, distribute literature, and speak about religion, provided it is not disruptive
- Organize student-led prayers, including Friday congregational prayers, if they do not disrupt school activities
- ► Request release time for Friday prayers or other religious services
- ► Be excused for religious holidays or from activities that conflict with your beliefs
- ► Establish a Muslim student group on campus with provisions equal to those of other religious student groups
- ▶ Express political views that are non-disruptive and in a peaceful manner



Guidance on Challenging Topics

Tools for the 9/11 Unit

The catastrophic events of 9/11 catapulted the Global War on Terror, marking an aggressive shift in U.S. domestic and foreign policy and an erosion of civil liberties through the Patriot Act, which practically targeted Muslims. The 9/11 attacks also marked a renewed and egregious "othering" of Muslims and those who may appear to be Muslim, which has been evident in mainstream media, on campaign trails, in literature and advertising, and even in the classroom.

To help teachers adopt a more nuanced approach to 9/11 in their classrooms, CAIR-NJ and Teaching While Muslim (TWM) developed a curriculum with pertinent tools to guide classroom discussions. The curriculum, which is tailored to elementary, middle, and high school levels, includes suggested texts, videos, novels, and discussion questions. Understanding the context of 9/11 and teaching about it in a way that does not target or marginalize any religious group is critical to creating a welcoming classroom environment. Issues related to Muslims, Arabs, Jews, Palestinians, and others against genocide

Schools serve as environments where students from diverse backgrounds learn about the world and acquire the skills to become informed citizens. The continued violence faced by Muslims, Arabs, Jews, Palestinians, and others, particularly since October 2023, has ignited worldwide discussions, including within educational settings.

Talking to Young Children About Gaza

Children hear about Gaza, and they deserve safe, honest, and ageappropriate conversations. CAIR encourages families and educators to provide compassionate guidance rooted in dignity and justice.

Tips for Parents & Educators:

- ▶ Listen first: Let children share what they've heard or felt.
- ► Affirm emotions: Validate sadness, fear, or confusion.
- ► Speak clearly: Use simple, age-appropriate language to explain injustice and human rights.
- ▶ Promote values: Emphasize fairness, nonviolence, and equality for all.
- Offer action: Encourage small, meaningful responses—such as prayer, kindness, or community support—that give children a sense of agency.

By centering compassion and truth, families can help children process difficult realities while building resilience, empathy, and pride in their identity.¹





Why talk about foreign issues in school?

Avoiding difficult topics can sometimes make students feel confused and powerless, especially if they rely on unreliable online sources. Parents and teachers can play a supportive role by fostering safe and welcoming environments. They can also share helpful skills that inspire students to engage in conversations with empathy and understanding, creating a more open and caring space for everyone.

Creating a Safe Space for Open Dialogue

- ► Ground discussions in facts: Provide accurate information about the realities of the Gaza genocide, including the violence and the imbalance of power.
- Facilitate respectful dialogue: Set aside time for students to share their perspectives while making clear that targeted bigotry or harassment will not be tolerated and will carry consequences.
- Protect free expression: Ensure students are not penalized or stigmatized for expressing support for Palestinian human rights and affirm that advocacy for Palestinian liberation is not equivalent to supporting terrorism or antisemitism.
- ► Promote understanding: Encourage students to explore key terms such as apartheid and terrorism through the lens of international law and human rights frameworks.
- ► Center universal values: Highlight principles of non-violence, equality, and the rejection of hate against any group as the foundation for discussion.

As you know, federal and state law require schools to provide reasonable accommodations for students' sincerely held religious practices. Across the country, districts regularly accommodate Muslim students for prayer, religious attire, meal needs, fasting during Ramadan, and attendance on Friday for congregational prayers.

(REQUEST TO LEAVE SCHOOL FOR FRIDAY PRAYER OPTION)

I request that my child be granted temporary leave, from the school's premises, with [NAME OF PERSON(S)] to attend Friday afternoon congregational prayer at our local Islamic center. Please allow this momentary leave for Friday Jummah prayer to be recorded by the school as an excused absence. My child would leave the school from [X:XX AM/PM] and return at [X:XX AM/PM], to pray in accordance with [his/her] sincerely held religious beliefs. Alternatively, the school may allow Muslim students on campus to hold their own Friday congregational prayer on campus.

The U.S. Department of Education has made it clear that schools may not prohibit or single out students for wearing religious attire. If exceptions to a dress code are made for nonreligious reasons, comparable exceptions must also be made for religious practice. Students also retain the right to display religious messages on clothing, just as they may display nonreligious messages.

I appreciate your cooperation in ensuring that my child can freely practice their faith while fully participating in the school community. I welcome the opportunity to discuss how we can work together to provide these accommodations while maintaining a safe and supportive learning environment. Thank you for your time and consideration, and I look forward to your response.

The U.S. Department of Education and federal law require schools to provide reasonable accommodations so that all students have equal access to meals without being forced to compromise their faith.

I respectfully request that my child be provided with appropriate meal alternatives, such as vegetarian, vegan, or halal-certified options, whenever standard school meals do not meet these requirements. If halal meals are not available, we request that the school provide vegetarian options consistently, ensuring my child has reliable access to nutritious meals each day.

I also request that school staff be informed about these dietary restrictions to prevent any confusion or inadvertent errors in meal service.

Thank you for your cooperation in helping create an inclusive and supportive learning environment. Please confirm that these accommodations can be provided. I look forward to your response.
